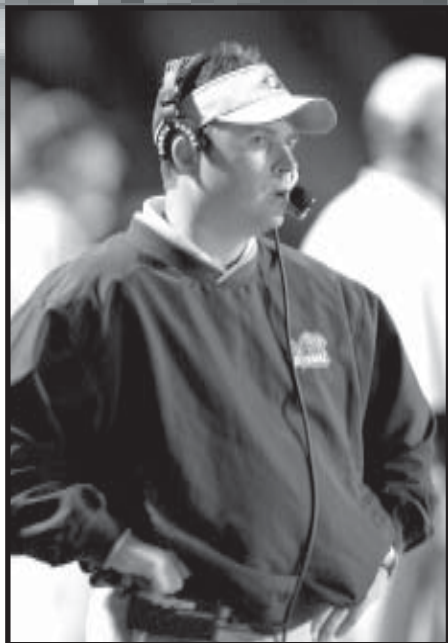


HEAD COACH TIM LANDIS



Having already resurrected programs at Davidson and St. Mary's, Tim Landis arrived at Bucknell in December 2002 to take over a football program that was undergoing a trying period.

As Landis' first spring practice approached, the Bison were still coping with the death of legendary head coach Tom Gadd, and they were still tasting the bitterness of a 2-9 record that ended a school-record run of seven straight winning seasons.

But under Landis' leadership, pride was quickly restored in the program, and the Bison turned in a very respectable 6-6 record (three of the six losses came by a combined six points), including a 4-3 mark in the Patriot League. Not bad for a team picked to finish dead last in the preseason coaches poll. In fact, Bucknell tied the league record for biggest one-season turnaround with a four-game improvement over the 0-7 PL record of 2002.

Landis' Bison built on that success last season, finishing strong with four straight victories to post a 7-4 season and a second straight third-place finish. Now, with many of his young recruits looking to play prominent roles in 2005, Bucknell should be a strong contender for its first Patriot League title since 1996.

Upon his hiring, Landis, 41, brought to the Bison football program an impressive cache of head coaching experience at the Division I-AA level. He became Bucknell's 25th head football coach since the program's inception in 1883.

"I have worked a very long time in this profession to earn a tremendous opportunity such as this," said Landis at the time of his hiring. "To coach at a quality educational institution like Bucknell that also has a long and

proud history of football is the culmination of a lifelong dream of mine."

"Not only has Tim Landis shown that he is an outstanding football coach, but he has achieved an impressive track record of recruiting and developing student-athletes at highly selective academic institutions," said director of athletics and recreation John Hardt. "Bucknell places great emphasis on developing the highest caliber student-athletes, both on and off the playing field, and we believe that Coach Landis is a perfect fit to lead our football program and successfully build on our established traditions."

Following a seven-year tenure as head coach at Davidson College, Landis spent the previous three seasons building a winning program at St. Mary's (Calif.) College. In both positions, he garnered national accolades for turning modestly successful programs into winners.

Upon his arrival at St. Mary's in the spring of 2000, the Gaels had been just 4-17 over the previous two seasons. Landis quickly forged a 6-5 season in his first year at the Moraga, Calif., school, marking the program's best one-year turnaround since football was reinstated at St. Mary's in 1967. The Gaels finished 6-5 again in 2001 and 6-6 in 2002, and Landis was twice honored as the Division I-AA Independent Coach of the Year.

Landis helped Davidson to a school-record eight victories in both 1998 and 1999, while laying the groundwork for a perfect 10-0 sea-

son the year after his departure to St. Mary's. Prior to Landis' arrival, Davidson had enjoyed just one winning campaign since 1980, but the Wildcats promptly went 6-4 in 1993 under the then first-year coach, and they would go on to enjoy four winning seasons in his seven years at the North Carolina institution.

Landis, who has a career head coaching record of 66-62-1, was very familiar with Bucknell and the Patriot League, having coached against league teams at both Davidson and St. Mary's. The Bison and Gaels

- The Bison Leadership Council is made up of two student-athletes from each of the four classes. They are elected positions, with each class voting for its own representatives.

- The Council meets with Landis on a weekly basis throughout the season, giving the players a forum to provide valuable feedback on a myriad of football-related matters.

Team Captains

- Unlike many other programs, Bucknell elects its team captains during preseason camp. This way, Tim Landis feels, those that are playing the best football, and those that have demonstrated the best leadership qualities, are the players that are most likely to be selected as team captains. One offensive player and one defensive player will be selected, while a weekly special teams captain will be picked throughout the season.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Tim Landis is a big believer in building positive relationships through community service. In just his first two years at Bucknell, Landis and his team have participated in several community events, including the annual Family Funfest, a cleanup day at Lewisburg's Little League baseball complex and the Light the Night Walk, which raises funds and awareness for leukemia and other forms of cancer. met twice, with St. Mary's winning 23-22 in overtime in 2002 and Bucknell capturing a 38-6 decision in 2001.

St. Mary's 2000 team gained acclaim for its victories over nationally ranked Colgate and a talented Towson squad. He also posted a win over recent Patriot League newcomer Georgetown during his stint at Davidson.

"Having so many roots in the East, I have followed the Patriot League for a long time and it is becoming one of the premier conferences in Division I-AA football," Landis said. "Just look at the success that Patriot League teams have had in the I-AA playoffs. Every school in the league has academic prestige and football prestige. That is a great combination."

Landis' trademark spread option offensive attack put up 2,908 ground yards in his first year at Bucknell, missing the school record by just a single yard while finishing 10th nationally in rushing offense. In 2004 Bucknell finished eighth in Division I-AA in ground yards, averaging 251.8 per game.

Also last season Landis coached defensive end Sean Conover to Second Team All-America and Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year honors. Daris Wilson shattered Bucknell and PL records for rushing yards by a quarterback in a game, season and career, and he became the first Bison QB to earn first-team all-conference honors in nine years. Electric return specialist Dante Ross earned PL Special Teams Player of the Year plaudits.

Landis is quick to stress hard work in the classroom as well, and last year his team set a league record with 26 players on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll. His team posted a combined 3.12 grade-point average in the spring 2005 semester, while Justin Gibson earned national Academic All-America honors.

In his first season at St. Mary's the Gaels ranked fourth nationally in rushing at 309.5 yards per game and 24th nationally in total offense at 434.4. The team broke school records for total yards (4778) and touchdowns (50) in a season. Defensively, the Gaels were equally opportunistic, ranking 12th in Division I-AA in turnovers forced (32). St. Mary's also ranked fourth in the country in rushing offense in 2001 and fifth in 2002.

At St. Mary's, Landis coached an Associated Press First Team All-American in defensive end Travis White, and he mentored a total of seven Academic All-District honorees in three years.

In his final season at Davidson, the Wildcats defense led the nation with a school-record 28 interceptions, including eight by All-American Ryan Crawford, who has joined Landis' staff at Bucknell in 2005. Landis' special teams unit blocked a Division I-AA record 13 kicks in 1999, and the defense allowed only 101 rushing yards per game to rank 13th in the nation.

In 1998, Davidson ranked first nationally in pass efficiency defense, second in scoring defense (a stingy 10.4 points per game allowed), fourth in total defense (231.9 yards per game) and 12th in rushing defense.

Landis originally joined the Davidson staff as its defensive line coach in 1991, and two years later, at the age of 29, he became one of the nation's youngest head football coaches.



A native of Yardley, Pa., and a 1982 graduate of The Hun School in Princeton, N.J., Landis went on to earn a bachelor of arts degree in English from Randolph-Macon College in 1986. A First Team All-Old Dominion Athletic Conference honoree both as a quarterback in football and a pitcher in baseball, Landis was inducted into the Randolph-Macon Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000 and earned the school's Distinguished Alumnus Award in February 2005.

He was the ODAC Baseball Player of the Year in 1986, and he also earned the school's Compton Award for excellence in academics and athletics. In May 2002, he was inducted into The Hun School's Hall of Fame.

Landis took his initial steps into the coaching profession in 1986, when he remained at Randolph-Macon to coach his alma mater's wide receivers. In 1988, he began a three-year stint as head football and baseball coach at Morrisville (Pa.) High School, where he led the grid squad to an 8-2 record in 1989, a state ranking and coach of the year honors by the *Bucks County Courier Times*, the Bicentennial Athletic League and the Independence Football League. He also guided the baseball team to a league title and served as director of athletics during his final two years.

Landis returned to the collegiate level in 1991, when he was hired as an assistant at Davidson.

Off the field, Landis is a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), where he serves as the chairman of that organization's Division I-AA All-America Selection Committee. He also served as a member of the I-AA AFCA Board of Directors Executive Committee.

This past offseason, Landis was one of five coaches bestowed the Johnny Vaught Head Coach Award at the All-American Football Foundation banquet in Princeton, N.J.

Landis and his wife Karen have three children — 13-year-old son T.J., four-year-old daughter Jordan and two-year-old son Jack.

COACHING STAFF

TIM CAMP

- Offensive Coordinator/Offensive Line
- Third Year at Bucknell
- Oregon State '96



Tim Camp returns for his third season with the Bison, and his second as offensive coordinator.

Camp came to Bucknell in 2003 as the offensive

line coach, then was promoted to offensive coordinator/line coach last season. Camp is tasked with orchestrating Bucknell's sophisticated spread option offense, and in 2004 the Bison averaged 26.9 points per game and topped the 40-point plateau three times.

The ground-oriented attack ranked eighth in all of Division I-AA with an average of 251.8 rushing yards per game, while quarterback Daris Wilson ran for 1,149 yards and 17 touchdowns, both school and league records for a QB. In 2004 Camp helped Wilson and offensive linemen Jon Scharf and Aaron DeGraffenreidt earn All-Patriot League honors.

This year he will have to mentor replacements for all three of those players, but still has plenty of offensive weapons returning, including veterans in FB Blamah Sarnor, RB Kenny Davis and OL Stephen Watts.

A 1996 graduate of Oregon State University, Camp formerly served as offensive line and tight ends coach at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

Camp was a four-year starter on the offensive line at Oregon State and earned All-Pac-10 honors. A Morris Trophy nominee, Camp spent one season with the NFL's San Diego Chargers after graduation.

Camp's collegiate coaching career began in the fall of 1996 at Western Oregon University, where he coached the offensive line, tight ends and special teams.

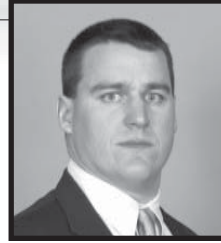
From 1997-2002, Camp served as offensive line coach, recruiting coordinator and strength and conditioning coordinator at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn. In 2000, he was promoted to offensive coordinator.

Camp spent one spring as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Randolph-Macon College before moving on to Nebraska-Omaha.

Camp and his wife Janet have two sons, Willie (5) and Walker (4).

JARED BACKUS

- Defensive Coordinator/Inside Linebackers
- Fourth Year at Bucknell
- Springfield '93



Jared Backus returns for his fourth season at Bucknell with a new assignment. Backus takes over as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach

after serving as special teams coordinator for the last three seasons and defensive line coach for the last two.

Backus, who takes over the defensive coordinator duties from new Davidson head coach Tripp Merritt, will have a deep, veteran group of defensive players to work with in 2004, headlined by All-American Sean Conover at defensive end. DL Andrew Decker, LB Dorian Petersen and CB Dante Ross are also cornerstones of what has the potential to be an outstanding defense.

As defensive line coach, Backus' group combined for 20 sacks last season, including 10.5 from Conover. Backus also oversaw the special teams units and mentored the first-ever Patriot League Special Teams Player of the Year in Ross, who returned two kickoffs for touchdowns in the same game at Georgetown last year.

In 2002, Backus coached Bucknell's vaunted outside linebacker unit and coordinated the special teams. His special teams units blocked a school-record 10 kicks, and he helped senior OLB Joe Massey earn First Team All-PL honors for the second time.

Backus came to Bucknell from the University of Maine, where he served as the Black Bears' defensive line coach and special teams coordinator from 1999-2001. He helped guide Maine to the 2001 Atlantic 10 title and the quarterfinals of the I-AA playoffs.

A 1993 graduate of Springfield College, Backus was a two-year football letterman as an inside linebacker. His first coaching experience came as a defensive/strength and conditioning intern at King's College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., in 1994-95.

Backus then completed graduate assistantships at Springfield and Rutgers before taking a position as inside linebackers coach at Lebanon Valley. In 1998 he was the defensive secondary coach at Pace University.

His wife, Amanda, is Associate Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator at Bucknell. The couple welcomed its first child,

STEVE PERRY

- Defensive Backs Coach (Safeties)
- Third Year at Bucknell
- Gettysburg '96



Another very highly regarded coach with past ties to Tim Landis is Steve Perry, who was a member of Landis' coaching staff at St. Mary's for three seasons before joining him at Bucknell in 2003.

Perry works with the Bison defensive backs, molding a unit that has ranked among the national leaders in interceptions in each of the last two seasons. A year ago he helped place senior defensive backs Jerome Acy and Virgil Rush on the All-Patriot League First Team, while returning cornerback Dante Ross finished the season with a three-interception game against Duquesne and will be an all-conference candidate this fall. This season Perry's focus will be on the safeties, led by probable first-year starter Stephen Collage.

Like at Bucknell, Perry also coached the defensive backs at St. Mary's. Among his outstanding cast were the 2002 Division I-AA Independent Defensive Player of the Year in free safety Weston Borba, and a two-time all-independent selection in cornerback Greg Kavulich. Borba had been a receiver until moving to the defensive side of the ball upon Perry's arrival in 2000, and Borba went on to become one of the top safeties in the Division I-AA ranks.

Before joining the SMC staff in 2000, Perry held the same title under Landis at Davidson in 1999. There he helped develop All-American Ryan Crawford, who recorded eight of the Wildcats' school-record and national-best 28 interceptions that season.

Perry is a 1996 graduate of Gettysburg College, where he was a three-year starter for the Bullets. In the three years following his graduation from Gettysburg, Perry was an assistant coach at his alma mater while obtaining his master's degree in athletic administration from Western Maryland College in 1999.



BRENT THOMPSON

- Quarterbacks/Fullbacks Coach
- Third Year at Bucknell
- Norwich '98



Brent Thompson is in his third season with the Bison coaching staff and second tutoring the quarterbacks and fullbacks.

Thompson last season worked closely with record-setting quarterback Daris Wilson, who earned First Team All-Patriot League honors after rushing for 1,149 yards and 17 touchdowns. Wilson broke school records for rushing yards by a quarterback and pass completion percentage (.660).

While Thompson's primary focus heading into the 2005 campaign will be the development of Wilson's successor, he does have plenty of returning talent at fullback in senior Blamah Sarnor and sophomore Josh DeStefano. Sarnor ran for 928 yards in 2003, but an injury cut his season short last fall. That opened the door for DeStefano, who ran for 243 yards in six games and was named the team's rookie of the year.

In 2002 as receivers coach Thompson helped the Bucknell wideouts make the successful transition to the spread option offense, while still maintaining the big-play explosiveness of the likes of Albert Marquardt and Nisan Trotter.

Thompson came to Lewisburg from Northeastern University, where he served a two-year stint as running backs coach. In 2002 he helped lead the Huskies to an Atlantic 10 championship. Three of his backs rushed for at least 500 yards, including first team all-conference tailback Tim Gale.

Thompson also coached Northeastern All-American L.J. McKanas, who broke the school's career rushing record and was second in the nation in rushing in 2001.

A two-year letterman as a defensive back for Norwich University in Northfield, Vt., Thompson graduated in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in peace, war and diplomacy.

He broke into the college coaching profession the following fall at Dickinson College, where he served as a graduate assistant coach, working with the outside linebackers. In 2000, Thompson moved to Stony Brook University, tutoring the Seawolves wide receiv-

MATT LINTAL

- Wide Receivers Coach
- Third Year at Bucknell
- Franklin & Marshall '03



Matt Lintal returns for his third season with the Bison coaching staff. In 2005 he will again oversee the wide receivers in Tim Landis' spread option offense.

Lintal, graduated from Franklin & Marshall University in May 2003, inherits a very talented, but relatively inexperienced, corps of receivers this season. A year ago he helped senior Nisan Trotter to a career-best season with 25 receptions for 461 yards. Now he will try to coax a similar season from junior Richard Simpson or a host of first and second-year players.

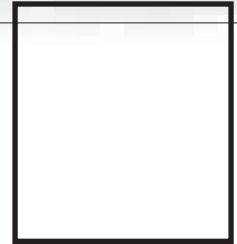
Lintal was a four-year starter at strong safety for F&M. He served as team captain as a senior and was a member of the Student Athletic Advisory Committee (SAAC) and the Athletic Honors Society.

The State College, Pa., native earned a bachelor of arts degree in psychology, with a minor in religious studies. He made the Dean's List at F&M seven times.

Lintal was a 1999 graduate of State College High School, where he earned three letters each in football and track. Prior to his tenure at Bucknell he returned to his alma mater as a volunteer coach at preseason workouts. He also coached a youth football camp for children aged 9 to 13 at Franklin & Marshall.

JIM REID

- Special Teams Coord./Def. Line Coach
- First Year at Bucknell
- Maine '73



Jim Reid brings more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience to Bucknell, including 15 as a head coach at Massachusetts and Richmond.

Reid will serve as the Bison's special teams coordinator and defensive line coach, where he will tutor All-America defensive end Sean Conover.

Reid, who served as defensive line coach at Syracuse last year, spent nine seasons as head coach at Richmond, leading the Spiders to 48 victories over that span (48-53-1). He ranks third on the school's all-time wins list as his teams posted three of the top 12 victory totals in program history. He guided Richmond to Atlantic 10 championships and I-AA playoff berths in 1998 and 2000, earning him league coach of the year honors both times. In 2000, the Spiders won a school-record 10 games, including a victory over Youngstown State in the first round of the I-AA playoffs.

A 1973 graduate of the University of Maine, where he was a three-year football starter, Reid began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UMass in 1973 under coach Dick MacPherson. Reid was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1978, a position he held until being named head coach in 1986. He then logged a 36-29-2 record in six seasons as head coach of the Minutemen and was the Yankee Conference Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1990. He led UMass to three conference titles.

Reid moved on to Richmond as defensive coordinator in 1992, then served in the same role at Boston College in 1994 before moving back to Richmond as head coach.



COACHING STAFF

RYAN CRAWFORD

- Defensive Backs Coach (Cornerbacks)
- First Year at Bucknell
- Davidson '01



Ryan Crawford is a first-year member of Tim Landis' coaching staff, although he is very familiar with Landis and his coaching style having played for him at Davidson during a standout collegiate career.

Crawford has served as an assistant coach at Davidson since 2003. He coached the Wildcats' quarterbacks in 2003 and the defensive backs last season. A 2001 Davidson grad with a degree in biology, Crawford earned Associated Press First Team I-AA All-America status in 1999 when he led all of I-AA with eight interceptions. His team led the nation with 28 pickoffs that season.

The following year, he was the I-AA Mid-Major Defensive Back of the Year and the I-AA Independent Defensive MVP. He was Davidson's Special Teams Player of the Year in 2000, as well as the school's male athlete of the year.

A native of Newton, N.C., Crawford played semi-pro football for the Carolina Cowboys, plus professionally with the Indiana Firebirds of the Arena Football League, and he was in camp with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League last summer. He also worked as a stuntman and a featured extra in the Sony Pictures movie "Radio" starring Cuba Gooding Jr.

Landis was head coach at Davidson from 1993-99 and recruited and coached Crawford for three seasons.

At Bucknell, Crawford will work with the Bison cornerbacks. He inherits a returning starter and All-Patriot League candidate in Dante Ross, along with a likely first-year starter in David Frisbey.

DICK CASSELS

- Assistant Offensive Line Coach
- First Year at Bucknell
- Kutztown '82



Another new member of the Bison coaching staff is Dick Cassels, who has been a well-known figure in the Lewisburg area since the late 1990s.

From 1997-2002 he was the head football coach at nearby Hughesville High School, where he was the Central Susquehanna Conference Coach of the Year in 1997, 1998, 2000 and 2002. He was also the Mid Penn Conference and the Pennsylvania District IV Coach of the Year in 2002, when he led the Spartans to a 9-3 record.

Currently a social studies teacher at Hughesville, Cassels has coached seventh, eighth and ninth-grade football at Lewisburg Area High School for the last two seasons. He was also head coach at Mount Olive High School in New Jersey from 1995-97, but prior to that stint Cassels spent 13 years coaching at the collegiate level with stops at Northeastern, Rutgers, Maine and Ohio University. In his most recent position at Ohio U., he coached the Bobcats' tight ends and receivers and served as passing game coordinator.

Cassels graduated from Kutztown University in 1982 with a degree in secondary education. He earned a master of science degree in educational strategies from Wilkes University in 2002.

At Bucknell, Cassels will assist Tim Camp in coaching the Bison offensive line. The line will be anchored by three returning starters in Stephen Watts, Stefan Niemczyk and Joel Hoffer.

STEVE HAYES

- Offensive Assistant Coach
- First Year at Bucknell
- Millersville '73



A veteran of the Pennsylvania college and high school coaching scene, Steve Hayes joins Tim Landis' staff in 2005 as a volunteer assistant

who will work with the Bison offense.

Hayes served as assistant coach at Juniata for the last 15 years, most recently as the Eagles' offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

A 1973 graduate of Millersville State University, Hayes entered the coaching profession at Bellwood Antis High School, first as an assistant, then as head coach in 1974. A year later he moved on to Lewistown Area High School, where he served as assistant coach until being named to the head post in 1981.

In 1983 he joined the collegiate coaching ranks for a two-year assistantship at Juniata before returning to the high school level at Kishacoquillas High School (1985-87) and Indian Valley High School (1987-88).

In 1990 he went back to Juniata as offensive line coach and remained with the Eagles through the 2004 campaign.

TRAVIS BURKETT

- Outside Linebackers Coach
- First Year at Bucknell
- St. Mary's '01



Travis Burkett is another Tim Landis protégé, stemming from his days at St. Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. Burkett joins the Bucknell staff in 2005 and will coach the Bison outside linebackers. He inherits two first-year starters in 2005, most likely senior James Lachman and junior Matt Palermo.

Burkett played middle linebacker under Landis at SMC, where he was a Second Team Academic All-District selection and the team's "Most Inspirational Player" in 2002. Last year he played for the Bergamo Lions in the National Football League of Italy. He helped lead the Lions to the Italian championship and runner-up honors in the EuroBowl.

In 2003 and 2004 Burkett served as varsity special teams coordinator, linebackers and tight ends coach at San Luis Obispo Senior High School. Last fall he helped lead the team to a 10-2 record and a berth in the section semifinals. A year earlier the team was 8-3 and fell in the second round of the



KENNY HARE

- Equipment Manager
- 14th Year at Bucknell



Now in his 14th season as the Bison football equipment manager, Kenny Hare is responsible for issuing equipment for every practice and game, transporting equipment to road contests and maintaining equipment inventory.

Hare also sponsors the Moxie Award, presented annually at the football team's postseason awards banquet. The award, named in honor of his grandfather, Walter J. Mahlon, is presented for special contributions to the Bucknell football program.

A native of Sunbury, Pa., Hare was elected in 2001 as Director of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association's District 2 region, and he just finished serving his second term this summer. Prior to that appointment, he had served as the vice president for the previous four years. District 2 has seen success in those years, having won numerous awards culminating with a member earning the

Glenn Sharpe Equipment Manager of the Year Award this year. Hare will now be serving on a handful of AEMA Board Committees to continue the District 2 tradition of being "Second to None."

Hare also volunteered with the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Pioneers in their inaugural year in AF2 in 2002.

Hare attended Penn State University and served as a student equipment manager for the Nittany Lions. While at PSU, Hare worked with the 1986 Penn State team that won the national title in the Fiesta Bowl, as well as the 1985 Orange Bowl team and the 1987 Citrus Bowl team.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The strength and conditioning program at Bucknell received a major boost a year ago with the completion of the Krebs Family Fitness Center and Berger Family Weight Room, as well as the hiring of Jerry Shreck as the program's first full-time strength and conditioning coordinator.

A 1996 graduate of East Stroudsburg University with a degree in movement studies and exercise science, Shreck is charged with implementing detailed daily strength and conditioning routines for each of Bucknell's programs.

The general philosophy of the Bison strength program is year-round periodization with a high-intensity base, supplemented with functional and sport-specific training. Training programs for most teams will employ explosion techniques with power bands and pliometrics.

The ultimate goal of the strength and conditioning program is the prevention of injuries and training athletes to their peak physical condition (as opposed to training



bodybuilders).

A native of nearby Montgomery, Pa., Shreck had served as the athletic trainer for the Bucknell men's basketball team for the last three seasons. He is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the National Council of Strength and Fitness.

Shreck is assisted by former Bucknell head football coach Bob Curtis, third-year assistant Tracy Sibley and a pair of interns.
